SUBJECT: Notice of Approval of Video Surveillance Policy

For the information of Council, the Video Surveillance Policy for the City of Welland was approved by the Corporate Leadership Team on July 16, 2025.

Video surveillance often captures the personal information of law-abiding individuals. Therefore, under the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (MFIPPA), municipalities have a duty to protect the recorded personal information of individuals. The Act places limits on the collection, use and disclosure of personal information.

The Information and Privacy Commissioner of Ontario issued guidelines in 2015 for municipalities to follow when using video surveillance in public spaces.

A policy is necessary to:

- Ensure consistent practices across departments.
- Demonstrate compliance with MFIPPA.
- Support transparency and public trust.
- Help mitigate legal, reputational, and financial risks.
- Provide a framework for appropriate use of technology.

The City Clerk or designate will be responsible for the administration of the policy, including receiving and processing requests for access to video footage records (typically law enforcement). The Manager of Facilities will be responsible for the coordination of specific tasks. These two positions also have joint responsibilities under the policy.

**SUBJECT:** Flexible In-Road Signs and Pavement Markings in School Zones

This memo has been prepared for information and serves as a follow-up to Councillor Chiocchio's Notice of Motion, that was approved by Council at the July 22, 2025 meeting, specifically:

THAT Council directs staff to report back to Council with costs of installing large roadway markings indicating school crossing zone as well as with mid road signage indicating speed. Staff to concentrate on high traffic school zones and for the report to come back prior to the September 2025 school year, and take an example of the Town of Pelham as they have school markings zones.

In early 2025, as part of an operation review, staff initiated the collection of traffic data at all schools within the City with the aim of assessing opportunities for improving student safety. Council will recall that as part of that review, staff recommended the installation of an Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) camera on Thorold Road in front of Gordon Public School, where a permanent 40 km/h speed zone will replace the existing flashing limit. Council approved the same on July 22, 2025.

Additionally, staff have assessed the traffic data and site-specific conditions, at the nine (9) schools located on arterial and major collector roads within the city. Based on this assessment, staff have concluded that flexible in-road centerline signage, paired with "School Ahead" pavement markings, can provide meaningful safety benefits in these higher-traffic areas, by providing visual cues to drivers, increasing speed compliance and improving overall awareness of school zone presence.



While flexible in-road signage is typically reserved for local and minor collector roads, it can be effectively deployed on arterial corridors when supported by appropriate engineering assessments. Depending on the specific site conditions, the proposed installations at the nine schools may include either a single centerline bollard or a combination of one larger centerline bollard and two smaller curbside bollards. These will be complemented by pavement markings indicating a school zone. The road signs, designed to flex upon impact to prevent damage to vehicles, will serve to create a visual narrowing of the road without impacting emergency vehicles. The signs will be installed seasonally, April to October to facilitate winter maintenance operations.

As an operational improvement, staff have already initiated the procurement of flexible in-road signage, with installation at the identified school sites scheduled for completion prior to the start of the September 2025 school year. The total estimated cost for this initiative is \$20,000, to be funded through the Traffic Operating Budget using Vision Zero funds allocated by the Regional Municipality of Niagara.

Attached is a list of the nine schools located on arterial and major collector roads that will receive flexible signage and pavement markings together with an example of both.

















Please be advised that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Thorold, at its meeting held on August 12, 2025, considered the aforementioned topic and passed the following resolution:

The Corporation of the City of Thorold enacts as follows:

WHEREAS democracy is healthy when everyone is able to participate fully and safely and contribute to the well-being of their community;

WHEREAS we are witnessing the dissolution of democratic discourse and respectful debate across all levels of government and in neighbouring jurisdictions;

WHEREAS Ontario's municipally elected officials are dealing with increasingly hostile, unsafe work environments facing threats and harassment;

WHEREAS social medial platforms have exacerbated disrespectful dialogue, negative commentary, and toxic engagement which disincentivizes individuals, especially women and candidates from diverse backgrounds from running for office;

WHEREAS better decisions are made when democracy is respectful and constructive and the voices of diverse genders, identities, ethnicities, races, sexual orientation, ages and abilities are heard and represented around municipal council tables:

WHEREAS the Association of Municipalities of Ontario's Healthy Democracy Project has identified concerning trends with fewer people voting in local elections and running for municipal office;

WHEREAS in 2024, female elected representatives from across Halton formed a group called H.E.R. (Halton Elected Representatives) which pledged to speak out against harassment and negativity in politics and call on elected officials to uphold the highest standards of conduct;

WHEREAS H.E.R. has launched a campaign called "Elect Respect" to promote the importance of a healthy democracy and safe, inclusive, respectful work environments for all elected officials that encourages individuals to participate in the political process; and

WHEREAS on June 5, 2025, the Canadian Association of Feminist Parliamentarians launched a non-partisan 'Parliamentary Civility Pledge" to encourage all parliamentarians to commit to end workplace harassment and increase civility on Parliament Hill, modelled after the pledge developed in Halton by representatives of H.E.R.

### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

- 1. That the City of Thorold Council **SUPPORTS** the 'Elect Respect" pledge and commits to:
- Treat others with respect in all spaces; public, private, and online;
- Reject and call out harassment, abuse and personal attacks;
- Focus debate on ideas and policies, not personal attacks;
- Help build a supportive culture where people of all backgrounds feel safe to run for and hold office;
- Call on relevant authorities to ensure the protection of elected officials who face abuse or threats; and
- Model integrity and respect by holding one another to the highest standards of conduct;
- 2. That the City of Thorold Council **CALLS ON** elected officials, organizations, and community members to support the 'Elect Respect' campaign and sign the online pledge at www.electrespect.ca;
- 3. That a copy of this resolution BE SENT to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Ontario's Big City Mayors, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, Niagara's MPs and MPPs, the Niagara Region, Niagara Regional Police, the Ontario Provincial Police and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police; and
- 4. That this resolution **BE SENT** to all of Niagara's local area municipalities with a request that their Councils pass a similar motion.

**AND WHEREAS** should a municipality continue to provide services to the 'ineligible sources, the municipality will be required to oversee the collection, transportation, processing of the recycling, assuming 100% of the cost which amounts to yet another provincial municipal download;

**NOW THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED THAT** the Council of the Township of North Glengarry hereby requests that the province amend Ontario Regulation 391/21: Blue Box so that producers are responsible for the end of life management of recycling product from all sources;

AND FURTHER THAT Council hereby requests the support of all Ontario Municipalities;

AND FURTHER THAT this resolution be forwarded to the Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the honourable Todd McCarthy, Minister of the Environment, Conservation, and Parks, Mike Harris, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry, Ric Bresse, Nolan Quinn Member of Provincial Parliament for Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, Minister of Affairs and Housing, Rob Flack and all Ontario Municipalities.

Subject: Proposed regulations to support the implementation of the proposed

Geologic Carbon Storage Act, 2025, if passed by the Legislature

### Hello,

Over the past three years, the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) has been taking a measured and phased approach to enabling and regulating geologic carbon storage (further referred to as carbon storage) in Ontario. Carbon storage is new to the province and developing a comprehensive framework to regulate this activity would help ensure that it is done responsibly, with measures in place to safeguard people and the environment.

Carbon storage involves injecting captured carbon dioxide into deep geological formations for permanent storage. This technology could provide industries in Ontario with a critical tool for managing their emissions and contributing to the achievement of Ontario's emissions reduction targets.

As you may be aware, the proposed *Geologic Carbon Storage Act, 2025* was introduced into the Ontario legislature on May 27<sup>th</sup>, 2025 as part of <u>Bill 27</u>, <u>Resource Management and Safety Act, 2025</u>. The Bill has now reached second reading in the Legislature, and debate of the Bill will continue after the legislature resumes on October 20<sup>th</sup>, 2025. The status of the Bill in the legislative process can be viewed on the Legislative Assembly of Ontario <u>website</u>.

The proposed Act, if passed by the Legislature, would require the development of supporting regulations that would cover the detailed regulatory requirements for the authorization of research and evaluation activities, and carbon storage activities, before the Act could be proclaimed and brought into force.

We are writing to notify you that the MNR is seeking feedback on the general content of proposed regulations that are being considered under the proposed *Geologic Carbon Storage Act*, 2025, if it is passed by the Legislature.
