**SUBJECT:** Response to Town of Pelham Memorandum RE: Inclusion of Clare Avenue

Urbanization in 2026 Development Charges Review (dated November 4, 2025)

The City's current Development Charge By-law No. 2022-163 will expire on August 18, 2027. The By-law will be updated through the preparation of a new Background Development Charge Study prior to the lapsing date. As part of the forthcoming study, a comprehensive review of applicable projects will be undertaken; including the request from Town of Pelham. The recovery of capital costs of development driven service expansions is governed by the Development Charges Act (1997) (DCA) and Ontario Regulation 82/98 (O.Reg. 82/98). The calculation and implementation of development charges (DC); including the requirement for municipalities to prepare Development Charge Background Studies and pass by-laws setting out the DC to be collected from developers are prescribed by the DCA and O.Reg. 82/98.

Re: Water Safety Resolution

Please be advised that the City Council of Niagara Falls at its meeting of October 28, 2025, passed the following resolution pertaining to a water safety resolution.

# THE CITY OF NIAGARA FALLS

**WHEREAS** drowning is one of the leading causes of preventable deaths among children in Ontario and research by the Lifesaving Society of Ontario shows that most children who drown never intended to be in the water; and

**WHEREAS** many children in Ontario do not have equitable access to swimming lessons outside of school due to financial, cultural or geographic barriers; and

Re: Provincial Decision on Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE)

The following recommendation of the Committee of Council Meeting of October 1, 2025 was approved by Council on October 15, 2025, pursuant to Council Resolution C230-2025:

#### CW303-2025

Whereas the Province of Ontario filed enabling regulations in December 2019, to prescribe the locations, fines, and signage for municipalities to utilize Automated Speed Enforcement Cameras (ASE) as a tool to address speeding and improve public safety; and,

Whereas the Province's ASE legislative framework, together with provincial encouragement in 2019, has led municipalities such as Brampton - where auto-insurance rates remain among the highest in Ontario - to implement ASE technology to improve safety, reduce speeding, and prevent serious collisions and fatalities; and,

Whereas the Provincial government, through the Ministry of Transportation, is responsible for the legislation, regulations and program standards governing municipal ASE programs; and.

Whereas some cities have implemented ASE incorrectly, Brampton is part of the vast majority of municipalities who have implemented best practices endorsed by the Ministry of Transportation and the Ontario Traffic Council - including speed thresholds - that prioritize public safety, resulting in safer roads; and,

Whereas consistent with local, regional, national and international research by third parties including <u>Sick Kids & Toronto Metropolitan University</u>, <u>the Canadian Automibile Association</u>, <u>the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police</u>, the <u>Traffic Injury Research Foundation</u>, and the <u>Ontario Traffic Council</u>; the City of Brampton's ASE program has resulted in significant reductions in speed, increased speed compliance in Community Safety and School Zones, and changes in driver behaviour as outlined in the September 10, 2025 Council report titled "<u>Automated Speed Enforcement – Traffic Safety Update"</u>;

Whereas the average recorded speed for ticket issued is 15.7 km/h over the posted limit, demonstrating that Brampton's existing threshold is both reasonable and aligned with best practices; and

Whereas between twenty and thirty percent of ASE ticket revenue is collected by the Province of Ontario.

Whereas Brampton is working to improve road safety and uphold its commitment to Vision Zero, through its ASE program and complementary traffic-calming measures such as speedbumps/humps, roundabouts, road diets, and improved signage, in order to reduce speeds, prevent collisions, and promote lawful driving behaviour.

Whereas the City of Brampton has already implemented a significant number of speedbumps, likely the most in the province with 834 locations and anticipates installing an additional 33 individual locations this year, but because speedbumps cannot be deployed in all areas around schools, a comprehensive approach to traffic calming, including Automated Speed Enforcement, has proven effective in reducing vehicle speeds, changing driver behaviour, preventing fatal collisions, and enhancing public safety;

Whereas polling in Brampton demonstrates strong and consistent public support for ASE as a tool to reduce speeding, including: Mainstreet Research (Early September 2025) showing 65% overall support, and the City-led Telephone Townhall poll (July 2025) showing 86% of participants support for speed cameras near schools and parks to help curb speeding; and

Whereas despite clear evidence and proven results from cities like Brampton, municipalities were caught off guard by the Premier's sudden announcement to cancel ASE programs across the province, made without adequate notice and consultation;

Whereas a preliminary estimate of private sector investment by companies delivering ASE solutions indicates the creation of 62 jobs and \$14 million dollars of investment in the province; and

Whereas the Premier believes some municipalities have misused ASE; but that is no reason to shut down municipal ASE programs that have proven successful at changing driver behaviour and improving public safety; and

Whereas the Premier's concerns regarding ASE can be addressed through amendments to provincial legislation, regulations and program standards that enable municipalities to consistently utilize ASE, without an outright ban on the technology; and,

Whereas Brampton's ASE program is considered best-practice and rather than banning, the Premier should meet with Mayor Patrick Brown and other municipal leaders to develop improved provincial legislation, regulations and program standards related to the ASE program; and,

Whereas it is reckless to abandon what works, and essential to maintain a program that preserves public safety, and, especially, at a very minimum, safety in school locations; and,

Whereas should the ASE program be cancelled, the considerable municipal investments to implement this provincially shaped program must be reimbursed, and additional funding must be provided to implement alternate, although not necessarily as effective, traffic calming measures.

#### Therefore be it resolved:

- 1. That Brampton City Council formally opposes the Province's decision to abruptly cancel ASE, a public safety tool enabled through provincial regulations in December 2019; and,
- 2. That a letter from Council be sent to the Premier, the Minister of Transportation, and local MPPs outlining Brampton's position, calling for the continuation of ASE, and Brampton Council request that the Premier meet with Mayor Patrick Brown, and other municipal leaders to negotiate consistent implementation across municipalities that utilizes best practices to uphold the public safety benefits of ASE; and,
- 3. That the City of Brampton immediately implement the following ASE program enhancements to accommodate concerns and maintain the technology as an effective public safety tool:
  - a. Limit the use of ASE cameras to school locations
  - b. Maintain the existing threshold and implement variable threshold speeds:
    - Maintain existing speed threshold during peak hours around schools
    - Implement a higher speed threshold for non-peak hours to enforce excessive speeding & stunt driving
  - c. Develop and implement a process to limit the number of tickets that can be issued to a single license plate within a defined period of time, excluding excessive speeding or stunt driving
  - d. Prohibit the operation of an ASE camera for six months following a speed limit change
  - e. Require that surplus ASE revenues be reinvested in road safety–related infrastructure, initiatives, and education
  - f. Require that staff report annually to Council, through the budget process, on the allocation and use of surplus ASE revenues
  - g. Require that staff report annually to Council on outcomes of the ASE program (e.g., number of tickets, speed reductions, speed limit compliance, collisions, injuries/fatalities, etc.); and,

- 4. That the City of Brampton request the Provincial government to amend their legislation, regulations and program standards governing ASE as follows:
  - Restrict the use of ASE to School locations
  - b. Use of ASE in areas that do not contain schools must be approved by the Minister of Transportation, supported by data clearly demonstrating the need and a description of why alternative traffic calming measures are not suitable for the location
  - c. Eliminate provincial fees and charges from ASE tickets, including:
    - MTO fee, currently \$8.25 per ticket, for providing registered license plate owner information
    - Victim surcharge fee ranging from \$10 to \$125 or 25% of the fine for speeding offences greater than \$1,000
  - d. Develop a revised fee schedule for ASE tickets that reduces the cost for lower speed infractions while maintaining higher penalties for excessive speeding and stunt driving
  - e. Extend voluntary electronic notification (SMS and/or email) to license plate holders to reduce the notification period for ASE offences, similar to license plate renewal notifications
  - f. Develop new signage to include language indicating that the location is speed camera enforced
  - g. Develop more visible ASE signage that includes the speed limit
  - h. Require municipalities to reinvest surplus ASE revenue into road safety-related infrastructure, initiatives and education
  - i. Require greater transparency from municipalities by implementing the following reporting requirements:
    - Report annually to municipal Council on how surplus ASE funds are spent.
    - Require annual public reporting of program outcomes (e.g., number of tickets, speed reductions, speed limit compliance, collisions, injuries/fatalities, etc.).

- j. Establish program standards across all municipalities for key program elements like speed thresholds through a process led by the Ministry of Transportation and in consultation with municipalities to ensure consistency and transparency for all municipalities in Ontario.
- k. That the Ministry of Transportation provide greater oversight and enforcement of Municipal ASE programs through regular audits; and
- 5. That, should the provincial government proceed with banning the use of ASE despite Brampton's immediate actions to address concerns and requests to work collaboratively with the Province and other municipalities to continue these programs, the Province must reimburse municipalities for all costs incurred to implement ASE program; and,
- 6. Staff be directed to report back on potential impacts of an ASE ban on Brampton's road safety strategy and financial investments; and,
- 7. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Transportation, Brampton members of Provincial Parliament, local MPPs across the Region of Peel, all Ontario Municipalities, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP), and the Ontario Traffic Council; and,
- 8. That the City develop an advocacy campaign consistent with this motion.

# **Economic Development Brief**

November 14, 2025

## **Statistics and Trends**

#### Labour market conditions

Seasonally adjusted labour market conditions in Niagara did not improve across most indicators in October, with the exception of population growth. Ontario and Canada performed slightly better with positive population, labour market, and job growth.

Month-over-month data from September to August 2025 show the following:

- Population: Niagara grew by 0.1% (300 people), while Ontario grew by the same rate.
- Labour force: Niagara decreased by 0.4% (1,100 people), while Ontario increased by 0.1%.
- Employment: Niagara decreased by 0.4% (1,100 people), while Ontario increased by 0.2%.
- Unemployment rate: Niagara increased by 0.1% to 7.2%, while Ontario remained at 7.8%.
- Participation rate: Niagara decreased by 0.3% to 59.3%, while Ontario decreased by 0.1% to 64.8%.

Niagara's seasonally adjusted labour force indicators showed little improvement but did not decline as sharply as in previous months. Unadjusted figures, however, showed solid gains: employment rose 0.7% (1,600 people) and the unemployment rate fell to 6.5%. Seasonal adjustment removes expected seasonal fluctuations to reveal underlying trends. So, while employment grew in October, the increase was smaller than typical for that month based on past patterns.

#### Bank of Canada rules out recession but predicts slow growth with rate cut

On October 29, the Bank of Canada cut its policy interest rate by 0.25 percentage points to 2.5%, citing a softening labour market and ongoing trade uncertainty with the US, but indicated that a recession is not expected under current conditions. Although growth remains weak at around 1% in the second half of 2025, the economy is adjusting to new trade realities, and fiscal policy rather than monetary policy will need to lead targeted responses to tariff impacts.

# 2025 living wage rates released for Ontario regions

The Ontario Living Wage Network recently released 2025 living wages by region. A living wage represents the hourly rate a worker needs to earn to cover basic expenses and participate fully in their community. For 2025, the living wage for Niagara is \$21.40 per hour, compared with \$27.20 for the GTA; \$24.60 for Bruce, Grey, Huron, Perth, and Simcoe; \$23.40 for Ottawa; \$23.00 for Dufferin, Guelph, Wellington, and Waterloo; \$22.60 for Hamilton; and \$21.05 for London, Elgin, and Oxford. # **Economic Development Updates**

Port Colborne Approves \$136 million infrastructure project to unlock industrial growth Port Colborne council has approved a \$136 million water and wastewater infrastructure project to service the city's east side, opening more than 400 hectares of industrial land, including the site of Asahi Kasei's lithium-ion battery separator plant that could create about 1,000 jobs. Funded largely through grants, regional support, and development charges, the project also includes a \$24.2 million canal crossing. The initiative, described as the city's largest ever jobs investment, will modernize aging infrastructure and establish new municipal enterprises to manage the systems while keeping project debt separate from the city's finances.

## Welland completes purchase of employment lands to support job creation

The City of Welland has purchased two parcels of land at 432 and 476 Ridge Road totaling 58 acres, including 47.6 acres of developable land, to create its seventh business park. Strategically situated near Highway 140, Highway 406, Highway 58A, and existing employment lands, the site is expected to accommodate up to 18 lots and generate between 200 and 800 jobs. This acquisition expands Welland's inventory of employment lands, which are designated to attract a range of industries, including advanced manufacturing, technology, and green innovation, supporting the city's strategic goal of fostering economic growth through infrastructure investment and sustainable development.

Niagara College expands beverage innovation capacity with major Pilot Plant renovation Niagara College has completed a major upgrade of its Beverage Pilot Plant at the Food and Beverage Innovation Centre, expanding capacity and adding industry standard equipment to help Canadian beverage companies develop, test, and scale new products safely and efficiently. The HACCP certified facility now supports small batch production from 50 to 1,000 L, including automated canning, pasteurization, carbonation, and shelf-life testing, bridging the gap many startups face before meeting co-manufacturer minimums. This renovation strengthens the college's role in applied research and commercialization, enabling faster product development, deeper collaboration with entrepreneurs, and hands-on learning opportunities for students.

#### Major upgrades made to historic Niagara Falls train station

The Niagara Falls Bridge Street train station has been renovated with a modernized interior, improved amenities, and preserved heritage features, as part of a \$4.4 million project funded by federal and provincial governments. The upgrades, including enhanced waiting areas, digital transit displays, and dedicated spaces for GO Transit, Via Rail, and WEGO, aim to prepare the region for increased ridership and support future all-day, two-way, hourly GO train service.

## Province increases GO Train trips to St. Catharines and Niagara Falls

Starting November 1, weekend GO Train service on the Lakeshore West line to Niagara Falls will increase, with eight trips, four each day, operating on both Saturday and Sunday. Beginning October 27, all Lakeshore West trips, weekdays and weekends, will stop at the new Confederation GO Station in Stoney Creek, including seven select trips extended to West Harbour GO Station. This expansion, part of the Niagara Extension Project, aims to improve commuting options for Niagara residents and enhance travel opportunities for visitors across the Greater Golden Horseshoe.

#### Research helps robots navigate complex greenhouse environments

Brock University engineers, led by Shengrong Bu and Shahryar Rahnamayan, have developed an advanced obstacle detection system that enables robots to navigate the complex, narrow environments of greenhouses. In partnership with Kevares Autonomous Services, the team integrated data from depth cameras, RGB cameras, ultrasound, and LiDAR using a sensor fusion algorithm and AI models, allowing robots to detect and avoid obstacles in real time. The system supports a wide range of greenhouse tasks including planting, watering, harvesting, and monitoring plant health while enhancing productivity and crop quality. Supported by the Greenhouse Technology Network and FedDev Ontario, the project aims to increase efficiency and innovation in Niagara's greenhouse industry, which comprises 163 greenhouses spanning 21 million square feet and serves as a key driver of the region's agricultural economy.

#### Niagara District Airport 2025–2045 Master Plan released

The Niagara District Airport 2025–2045 Master Plan was released on October 28. It envisions transforming the airport from a modest general aviation facility into a modern regional gateway, enhancing connectivity for residents and visitors while generating over \$1 billion in economic output and serving millions of passengers. The plan outlines phased infrastructure investments, including runway extensions, a new terminal with security and customs facilities, apron expansions, and commercial development, while incorporating advanced technologies such as electric aircraft and vertiports, all guided by sustainable practices and effective governance. By strategically sequencing growth, leveraging Niagara's tourism potential, and fostering partnerships with airlines and government, the airport aims to become a catalyst for regional economic growth, improved travel options, and long-term community benefits. At its regular meeting held on November 11<sup>th</sup>, 2025, the Council of the Township of Selwyn passed the following resolution:

Resolution No. 2025 – 223 – Curbside Recycling – Non Profits

Whereas the Province of Ontario designated producers to be responsible for collecting recycling in the Province; and

Whereas non-profit organizations, including our local food banks, have been deemed ineligible for producer blue box collection effective January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2026; and

Whereas food insecurity is a local, provincial and federal issue; and

Whereas food banks need to receive grocery items that are delivered in cardboard boxes and cartons which generate copious amounts of recyclable material; and

Whereas food banks are volunteer and donation based with no revenue collected to pay for services such as removal of recyclable materials;

Therefore be it resolved that the Council of the Township of Selwyn strongly urge the Province to re-instate the eligibility for curbside blue box collection as of January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2026, for non-profit organizations, such as food banks; and

That this motion be forwarded to Premier Doug Ford, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks, MPP Dave Smith, County and City of Peterborough, Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Eastern Ontario Wardens' Caucus and Ontario Municipalities for support.

Under the Province's producer-responsibility framework, food banks and similar non-profit organizations have been deemed ineligible for curbside blue box collection effective January 1, 2026. This change will place an unreasonable burden on these essential community services that rely entirely on volunteers and donations.

Food banks play a critical role in addressing food insecurity — an issue of local, provincial, and national importance. These organizations receive large quantities of grocery items packaged in cardboard and other recyclable materials, yet they have no sustainable means to manage the associated recycling costs once municipal collection ends.

The Township of Selwyn strongly urges the Province of Ontario to reinstate eligibility for curbside blue box collection for non-profit organizations, such as food banks.

Dear Mr. Benin.

The closing of The Beer Store is the final nail in the coffin for those of us in the town of Wawa who are interested in our environment and recycling. I am not a consumer of alcohol, but since 1992, I have picked up the sad, abandoned packaging others have thrown out on the sides of our roads.

As a volunteer, I have cleaned our outdoors of trash by the truckloads and most of it was made up of beer and wine containers. Having a European background and knowing that even pop cans have a deposit of 10 cents on them there, it is with tears in my eyes that I see the loss of a place to turn in recyclables.

I fought the bureaucracy, wrote to companies and ministers about the abuse of our environment and the renewable resources until finally a deposit was established here in Ontario. The program encourages people to turn in their recyclables rather than putting them in the landfill and the pennies add up.

Here in the north, we live in an "untouched" wilderness and try to promote this for tourism, hunting, and fishing. Often, one of the first stops in town is The Beer Store. Why is this now closed when the nearest store is over 200 km away and there is now no place to accept the empties? Our grocery store had beer and wine when that program was first introduced, but has now cut back as they don't want to accept the recyclables. The one convenience store is also not set up for recyclables and doesn't carry the selection of products The Beer Store did.

So, while it is still possible to purchase a limited selection in our town, the loss of the recycling program affects us deeply. Many organizations, such a skating clubs, hockey teams, Boy Scouts/Girl Guides and even retirees profit from the deposit through bottle drives. These assist the community and keep our outdoors clean to benefit the environment as well. Cans and bottles do not disintegrate in the outdoors. To the contrary, broken glass hurts people and wildlife both. Why are we going backwards on this important recycling project? Why are we in the North forgotten.

We will be drowning in beer cans without a recycling program. What is the solution? Please find one as it is you and this government that have made these changes.

For your information and records, at its meeting of Municipal Council held on October 21, 2025, the Council of the Town of East Gwillimbury enacted as follows:

WHEREAS on April 17, 2025, the Government of Ontario brought forth Bill 5: "Protect Ontario by Unleashing Our Economy", a broad omnibus legislation that introduces sweeping changes to multiple environmental and planning statutes, including the Environmental Assessment Act, Endangered Species Act, Ontario Heritage Act, and others; and

WHEREAS this legislation was passed through the legislature in 49 days, thus limiting opportunities to provide feedback; and

WHEREAS Bill 5 received Royal Assent on June 5, 2025; and

WHEREAS the "Protect Ontario by Unleashing Our Economy" Act, 2025 enables the creation of Special Economic Zones (SEZs), which allow the provincial cabinet to exempt projects from compliance with municipal bylaws, environmental protections, and Indigenous consultation obligations; and

WHEREAS lands under protection through various provisions, such as the Oak Ridges Moraine and the Greenbelt Protected Countryside, constitute 83% of the total EG area, which makes EG relevant in environmental stewardship for the Region and the Province; and

WHEREAS the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and the Greenbelt Plan are foundational to protecting the ecological and hydrological integrity of the region, and the provisions in the Protect Ontario by Unleashing Our Economy Act, 2025 directly conflict with the objectives of these plans; and

WHEREAS in alignment with the 2022 – 2024 Strategic Plan, EG Council declared a Climate Emergency in 2023 and approved the EG's Thinking Green Environmental Strategy in 2024, highlighting EG's commitments and efforts to preserve and restore the environment as EG grows; and

WHEREAS the Town of East Gwillimbury achieved 92% of its 2024 housing target, regardless of current environmental provisions, demonstrating that promoting sustainable growth is not only responsible but necessary;

WHEREAS the Conservation Authorities Act (1946) enables municipalities to establish local conservation authorities, and when municipalities choose to form such authorities, they assume responsibility for governance and funding through the appointment of a Board of Directors and the provision of an annual levy to cover expenses;

AND WHEREAS the municipalities within Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry (SDG) established South Nation Conservation (SNC) in 1947 and the Raisin Region Conservation Authority (RRCA) in 1963;

AND WHEREAS local municipalities currently provide between 25% and 50% of total conservation authority funding, while the Province of Ontario provides approximately 3%;

AND WHEREAS municipalities have governed their respective conservation authorities for decades, tailoring programs and services to local watershed needs, maintaining accountable service standards, and ensuring fair and predictable costs for ratepayers;

AND WHEREAS conservation authorities collectively own and manage thousands of acres of land, much of which was donated by local residents and entrusted to conservation authorities as a personal legacy for long-term protection, stewardship, and the public good, with the expectation that such lands would be cared for by locally governed conservation authorities;

AND WHEREAS Bill 68 (Schedule 3) proposes the creation of the Ontario Provincial Conservation Agency, a Crown corporation that would assume governance responsibilities and consolidate Ontario's 36 conservation authorities into seven regional authorities, with municipal cost apportionment yet to be defined;

AND WHEREAS the Province already possesses the authority to establish overarching legislation, regulations, and standards through the Conservation Authorities Act and the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry calls on the Government of Ontario to maintain local, independent, municipally governed, watershed-based conservation authorities to ensure strong local

representation in decisions related to municipal levies, community-focused service delivery, and the protection and management of conservation lands;

AND FURTHER THAT while the United Counties of SDG supports provincial goals for consistent permit approval processes, shared services, and digital modernization, imposing a new top-down agency structure without strong local accountability and governance risks creating unnecessary cost, red tape, and bureaucracy, thereby undermining efficiency and responsiveness to local community needs;

AND FURTHER THAT the United Counties of SDG supports efforts to balance expertise, capacity, and program delivery across the province, and requests that the Province work collaboratively with municipalities and local conservation authorities to determine the most effective level of strategic consolidation to achieve both provincial and local objectives.

AND FURTHER THAT a copy of this resolution be sent to the Ontario Minister of Environment, Conservation, and Parks, to the local MP and MPPs, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, the Rural Ontario Municipal Association, and all municipalities and Conservation, Authorities in Ontario.

#### Re: Solve the Crisis and Winter Homelessness Program Support

The following resolution was passed by Ajax Town Council at its meeting held on November 17, 2025:

Whereas, we are approaching the cold winter months and the number of people experiencing homelessness in Ajax and Durham Region continues to rise drastically, with more than 1,000 people on Durham Region's by-name list as of August, including specifically 200 people in Ajax seeking support to change their housing status<sup>1</sup>; and

Whereas, in September 2024, Ajax Council passed a motion to support Ontario Big City Mayors (OBCM) <u>SolvetheCrisis.ca</u><sup>2</sup> campaign requesting that the provincial and federal governments take immediate action to solve the homelessness and mental health crisis gripping our communities; and

Whereas, while the provincial government has provided support for new programs such as Homeless and Addiction Recovery Treatment Hubs (HART Hubs), it does not adequately address the growing crisis and the financial and social impact on municipalities and regions; and

Whereas, according to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, municipalities are providing <u>51.5%</u> of the total reported <u>homelessness program funding across</u> <u>all three levels of government,</u> making a significant financial impact on municipal budgets<sup>3</sup>; and

Whereas, OBCM recently passed a motion at their October Meeting re-iterating the need for provincial support in addressing this crisis by allocating more funding to programs that address chronic homelessness; and

Therefore, be it resolved:

- 1. That Ajax Council reconfirms their support of the Solve the Crisis Campaign and calls on Ajax residents to join us in appealing to the provincial and federal governments for support by visiting SolveTheCrisis.ca; and
- 2. That Ajax Council asks that the provincial government to take action on the requests of the Solve the Crisis Campaign that have not been fully addressed including:
  - a. Appoint a responsible ministry and Minister with the appropriate funding and powers as a single point of contact to address the full spectrum of housing needs as well as mental health, addictions and wrap around supports.
  - b. This single Minister must strike a task force with sector representatives including municipalities, health care leaders, first responders, community services, the business community, and the tourism industry to develop an Ontario Action Plan.
  - c. Provide municipalities with the tools and resources to transition those in encampments to more appropriate supports, when deemed necessary.
  - d. Commit to funding the services our unhoused population needs, community by community, to fill in gaps in the system.
  - e. Invest in 24/7 community hubs or crisis centres to relieve pressure on emergency departments and first responders; and
- 3. That Ajax Council asks that the provincial government prepares a 2025/2026 winter homelessness response plan to help municipalities ensure that we can keep our unsheltered residents who are sleeping outdoors with the services they need to keep them safe in colder weather; and
- 4. That a copy of this resolution be sent to Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, Rob Cerjanec, MPP for Ajax, local MPPs across the Region of Durham, Durham Regional Council, all Ontario Municipalities, Ontario Big City Mayors (OBCM).

#### Re: Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) Cameras

At the Regular Council meeting on October 21st, 2025, the Council of the Township of South-West Oxford directed staff to write a letter in opposition to the Provincial decision on Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) Cameras.

In December 2019, the Province of Ontario established regulations allowing municipalities to use ASE cameras to address speeding and enhance public safety. Following provincial encouragement, municipalities adopted ASE technology to reduce speeding, prevent collisions, and save lives.

Research at local, regional, and international levels supports the effectiveness of ASE programs, indicating a significant reduction in speeding, improved compliance in school and community safety zones, and positive changes in driver behavior. The suggestion that the Provincial government views the ASE program as a "cash grab" is entirely unfounded, as revenue generated through ASE arises solely from individuals who choose to disregard posted speed limits. If drivers comply with speed regulations and adjust their behaviour accordingly, there would be no generated revenue from ASE cameras.

Municipal councils are directly responsible for the health and safety of their communities and are therefore best positioned to determine the areas of greatest concern regarding local driving conditions. Each municipality understands the unique traffic patterns, school zones, and community safety issues within its jurisdiction. Furthermore, policing and traffic enforcement are municipal responsibilities, and as such, municipalities should have the autonomy to determine whether and how to deploy ASE technology in the most effective and efficient manner to protect residents and road users.

Following significant municipal investment across Ontario, the recent decision, made without consultation, to cancel Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) programs has

raised serious concerns. Rather than an outright ban, adjustments to existing legislation and program standards would provide a more balanced and collaborative approach. Therefore, the Council of the Township of South-West Oxford respectfully requests that this decision to ban ASE cameras be reconsidered, and that municipalities be permitted to continue using ASE cameras in school zones and urban areas where local councils deem them warranted. At a time when police services are facing significant resource constraints that limit their capacity to enforce speed limits, ASE cameras remain a necessary tool to address community safety concerns.

For an average new home in our community, the 13 percent HST adds tens of thousands of dollars to the purchase price, a burden that directly undermines our shared goal of making homeownership affordable for working families and seniors. Removing that tax would provide meaningful relief.

Bradford West Gwillimbury is one of Ontario's fastest-growing municipalities, investing heavily in growth-related infrastructure while working to keep housing within reach. We urge both levels of government to work together on this change as part of a broader strategy to make homeownership attainable again for young Canadians. Simply put, cutting taxes in this way will help make life more affordable.

We would welcome the opportunity to contribute to any federal-provincial review of housing-related taxation and policy tools that can help deliver more affordable homes.

 Wishes to formally state that it opposes the consolidation of Ontario's conservation authorities without knowing the full financial and operational impact to municipalities and the conservation authorities; and,  Directs the Acting Clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to the Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the Honourable Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks, Todd McCarthy, the Honourable Rob Flack, Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, Anthony Leardi, MPP, Essex, Lisa Gretzky, MPP Windsor West, Andrew Dowie, MPP Windsor-Tecumseh, Trevor Jones, MPP Chatham-Kent-Leamington, AMCTO, AMO and all Ontario Municipalities.

#### Re: Impacts of Provincial Bill 60 on Tenants in Hamilton - REVISED

Hamilton City Council, at its meeting held on Wednesday, November 19, 2025, passed the following resolution:

Item 9.3 of the General Issues Committee Minutes 25-016:

#### 9.3 Impacts of Provincial Bill 60 on Tenants in Hamilton - REVISED

WHEREAS, on October 23, the Provincial government introduced Bill 60, Fighting Delays, Building Faster, which seeks to weaken rent control and make rental tenure less secure;

WHEREAS, Council has introduced bylaws and policies to protect tenants from renovictions and to strengthen protections for tenants;

WHEREAS, Council has enacted new legislation to improve property standards, ensure health and safety in apartment buildings, and implement an Adequate Temperature Bylaw to address the impacts of extreme heat;

WHEREAS, the majority of residents living in Wards 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 are tenants; approximately one third of all City residents rent their homes; and tenant populations in suburban and rural Wards are growing rapidly;

WHEREAS, through Ward 2 Tenant Town Halls, the Ward 2 Tenant Survey, and the Ward 2 Tenant Council, tenants have expressed anxiety about rental tenancy and rent control including the impacts they've faced since the Provincial government changed legislation in 2018 to eliminate it.

WHEREAS, the Provincial government has suggested it will backtrack on some parts of its proposed legislation but has not confirmed what the impact will be, what will be changed, or how this legislation will be implemented; and,

WHEREAS, a similar motion, entitled Impacts of Provincial Legislation that Weakens Rental Protections was passed by the City of Toronto's Executive Committee on November 4, 2025.

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That the Mayor, on behalf of City Council, inform the Government of Ontario and all Hamilton Members of Provincial Parliament of its opposition to changes to the *Residential Tenancies Act* in Bill 60 and the weakening of tenant rights including contemplated changes to "security of tenure" or a further weakening of rent control;
- (b) That the General Issues Committee direct the City Solicitor to work with the Hamilton Legal Clinic and report back in Q1 2026 through a Closed Session Information Report to review legal options and provide advice to protect renters and challenge the provisions of Bill 60, including potential Charter protections;
- (c) That staff from the Housing Services Division report back to the General Issues Committee, through an Information Report and presentation, on the potential impact of Bill 60 including changes to "security of tenure" and rent control, in Q4 2025; and
- (d) That this resolution be circulated to AMO, FCM and all Ontario municipalities.
